## I. Course Description

A four week rotation which will include working on an inpatient treatment team with an attending, second year psychiatry resident, and either one or two third year medical students. Patients will have serious psychiatric illness (predominantly schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder, bipolar disorder, major depression, and dementia) and concomitant medical illnesses. In addition to clinical rounds, there will be opportunities to participate in team meetings, and educational conferences on the inpatient unit. Usually there is one weekend of day call, but no overnight call.

#### III. Methods of Instruction:

- A. Didactic: Includes resident lecture series on Tuesdays, unit didactics on Thursdays, and attendance at Grand Rounds on Wednesdays. In addition, there will be individual supervision with a faculty member.
- B. Clinical: Attendance and participation at team meetings, attending rounds, community meetings and to act as a sub-intern with certain selected patients.

## IV. Overview of student responsibilities:

Responsibilities will include evaluating and meeting with patients, admission notes, progress notes, participation in treatment team with the designated resident and attending.

IV. Method of evaluation of students and requirements: The grade will be Pass/Fail system and will be based on performance. Areas of performance include patient/student interaction, patient/staff interaction, level of responsibility, application of knowledge to clinical practice and participation in educational activities.
