<b>Rationale</b> : The aim of this curriculum is to introduce pre-clerkship medical students to the field of geriatric medicine in an interactive and reflective format. Students will each be assigned an older adult in the Dallas community with whom each student will visit monthly. Students will be asked to complete fun activities with their older adults which relate to the topic of the class before their volunteering experience. Topics include ageism in our society, mobility as one ages, living locations of older adults, and the challenges of caregiving for an older adult. Students will have opportunities to reflect on their experiences both during class and during the "asynchronous" component of the curriculum, activities during which students will complete a short activity (i.e. listening to a Ted Talk, reading a poem, viewing a set of photographs). While not required, students will be encouraged to keep in touch with their older adult after the end of the course. Through placing an emphasis on experiential learning and on serving older adults through volunteer opportunities, we hope to prepare medical
